Aims of Pruning

- Aim is to get the right number of high-quality one-year-old buds, evenly spaced and tied down across the canopy whilst also
 - Renewing fruiting wood
 - Preventing shading and overcrowding
 - Removing diseased and broken wood
 - Maintaining vine form and size
 - Maintaining plant health



Plants response to pruning


- Pruning removes old, established wood and stimulates new shoot growth immediately below the cut
- Flat downward growth is the most fruitful
- Upright growth tends to be strong growing but less fruitful
- Kiwifruit vines have strong apical growth
- These apically dominant buds are the first to move in the spring and the growth from lower lateral buds is suppressed by them
- Summer pruning stimulates regrowth

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Apical Dominance

 The bud at the tip (the apical bud) of the shoot produces plant growth regulators that stop other buds from growing – it dominates





Apical Dominance





- Apical dominance is used to encourage strong growth up strings
- Where you make a cut, you are likely to get strong growth (mostly)



Stringing

- A technique used in Gold3 to maximise vegetative growth
 - When establishing young vines
 - To re-invigorate a canopy
- Not so successful in Hayward
- Strung canes are not as fruitful







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














Kicking Out

- Kick unwanted suckers off at the base of the sucker


